


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Healey Lake Golf Tournament ... an update

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Loons Go South

It is with sadness, we say goodbye to another wonderful summer. Unfortunately in my travels this summer I didn't see any young loons, however a few friends on the lake did spot a couple of young loons on our lake.

The weather this Thanksgiving weekend was wonderful; however, there was a noticeable quiet observed since our adult loons have once again left the lake on their way to the sunny south for the winter.

Here are some migrating facts about the Common Loon. Our loons will be migrating south sometime in the month of October to the area around the Gulf of Mexico. For the loons to be able to "take off" from any lake, they run along the surface into the wind. The distance needed to gain flight depends on wind speed; in calm times, the bird may run as far as several hundred metres before it gains enough speed to take off. Once in the air the loon can travel swiftly. Its relatively small wingspan (130 to 140 cm) carries it at average speeds of 120 km per hour during migration. The wings beat quickly to carry the large body and have a high degree of curvature to provide lift.

Migrating Common Loons occasionally land on wet highways or parking lots, mistaking them for rivers and lakes. They become stranded without a considerable amount of open water for a long take off. A loon may also get stranded on a pond that is too small.

Young loons must wait until their flight feathers grow and their wings are strong enough. This does not usually occur until late November.

Loons are usually found in groups on the wintering grounds in the Gulf of Mexico. The Common Loon is flightless for a few weeks after moulting all of its wing feathers - at the same time in midwinter. All loons have greyish feathers in the winter time (they lose their distinctive black and white checker markings and white necklace). Immature birds

resemble adult birds in winter plumage however the white feathers of the belly and wing are present all year long. Loons moult again in late winter before returning to nesting grounds in spring. The dull winter coat is replaced by their beautiful black and white coat.

Next spring, the loons will return in pairs, when the ice starts melting, to their nesting grounds to claim their territory. They are solitary nesters. Small

lakes, generally those between 5 and 50 hectares can accommodate one pair of loons. Larger lakes may have more than one pair of breeding loons, with each pair occupying a bay or section of the lake. Until recently, loons were thought to mate for life. Banding studies have shown that loons will sometimes switch mates after a failed nesting attempt even between nestings in the same season.

Did you know?

- The Common Loon has existed for 10 million years,
- They are very clumsy on land because their feet are placed too far back on their body for balanced walking,
- 80% of the world's Common loons are found in Ontario lakes.

Over the past 20 years, 59 lakes in Greater Sudbury have been monitored off and on by lake residents and community volunteers who complete the Canadian Loon Lakes survey to track the breeding success and chick survival of loons. I will continue to submit for Healey Lake however if anyone ever has any interesting facts or sightings please call and let me know.

Have a wonderful winter and see you all next year on the lake.

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Canada Geese on Healey Lake



As you all have seen this summer our lake is now home to many Canada Geese.

Although pretty birds they, over time, will keep reproducing and have the potential to pollute our lake.

Many people assume that Canada geese fly south in the fall to reach warmer climates, then return to nest in early spring. This behaviour has changed over the years, and wildlife

specialists are seeing more geese remain in one spot year round. They are now known as the residential goose. There are usually three common items that define their ideal location: a mild climate, food and water. Therefore our lake is a prime target for these geese to become permanent residents.



Therefore if you see 30 geese then they would produce 30 pounds of droppings in one day! Problems at our lake can include accumulations of droppings and feathers on our beaches, and rocky shores, lawns, public health concerns in lakes and drinking water supplies, and aggressive behaviour to our

returning birds (that we welcome on our lake).

Property owners and communities on our lake that have experienced problems in the last year can expect geese to return again unless control measures are implemented. The best time to act

is early spring, before nesting begins, or as soon as geese show up where they are not wanted.

There are visual things that we as cottagers can do to help deter these pesky birds. Visual deterrents include balloons, flash tape or something as simple as a string tied between two sticks placed on the water's edge. These items work well when set up where the geese are entering a property. If you have geese entering your lawn from a water area, the bank is an ideal spot for placing such items.

Hopefully with the effort from all of us, the geese will leave our lake and move on to another location. Let's work together to ensure that we deter these birds from staying.

History of the Healey Lake Bell

In the late 1940s and 1950s, my father, Martin Deak had a barber, Sam Cerone. His barbershop was located in Youngstown, Ohio. He and his wife Dorothy bought land on Healey Lake with their sons and began a fishing lodge.

That lodge became the fishing destination of the Deak family and many others from the Youngstown area.

The only access to Healey Lake at that time was a dirt road down near the end of the Lake and across from the lodge. When anyone arrived, the signal was to beep your horn until Sam heard you. During storms the sound did not carry very well. So, around 1954 Sam decided to have a bell made. He knew of a famous bell maker about an hour from Mactier. Making bells by hand was not easy but this man loved to do it. So, his policy was that he would try to forge a bell for you. If it did not work, you had to pay for his time and materials. If it did work, all you had to pay for was materials, because he found creating a working bell such a joy.

The Healey Lake bell was hung at the end of the dock in the parking area at the end of the Lake and across from the Lodge and it worked. Now, everyone could hear the bell when someone arrived to stay at the lodge or deliver something. Sam would come across in his very large barge to pick up cargo and/or people.

Time passed, my father had a heart attack and we stopped coming to the lodge. About 1975, my mother (Marie Deak) wanted to come back to Healey Lake and revisit all the memories our family had over the years. So, she and I drove up to Mactier and were amazed to see a road all the way to the lodge. The next day as we were fishing at the end of the lake, we saw the old dock, which was close to falling apart and dropping into the lake. And, still hanging by a rusty nail at the end of the dock: the Healey Lake bell. It was rusty and barely hanging there.

We climbed precariously onto the dock from our little fishing boat. We were about to risk falling into the lake for this important 'rescue' mission. While I held the bell, my mother managed to pull out the nail that held it dangling above the water. I almost fell into the lake as the weight of the bell came into my arms. But, I didn't ...

I have to confess, we didn't tell the then owners of the lodge that we had 'rescued' the bell. By this time, Sam has died and Dorothy has sold the lodge.

It had such memories for our family. And, after all, no one seemed to care about it: it was rusty and about to fall into the lake.

So, we wrapped it in a blanket, put it in the trunk of our car and took it home to

Hubbard, Ohio (a suburb of Youngstown).
We cleaned the bell, painted it and had a

metal frame pole made for it outside my mother's house. As people arrived, they would ring the bell. My mother would also use it when she called her dog.

And so it stayed in Hubbard until 1998 when my mother died. I could not bear to have it sold with the house. My brother Martin and I dug it up and I took it home to Hudson Ohio where I lived. It sat in the garage for a few years, all the while

I thought about what to do with it. It seemed best to take the bell home. I am not sure what year it was when I brought it back to the lodge, probably early 2000s.



I hope it still hangs proudly in the front of the lodge. Sam would approve.

WEBCAM

The HLPOA webcam is up and running! As a complement to the Mariners Cove Marina webcam, the HLPOA webcam is situated on the south side of the main channel approximately 5 km down from Mariners Cove and 1 km east of Blueberry Island.

The webcam is situated right over the water which will allow viewers to see water (and ice) conditions up close. We can remotely move the camera lens side to side (135 degrees) so this will allow us to look at different views from time to time. Another neat feature of the HLPOA webcam is that the picture is a 'live' picture. When you click on the Webcam tab on the website, the camera takes a picture at that precise moment and downloads it to your screen. This process only takes a few seconds (under 5) in any testing we have done – it is worth the wait!

A big thank you to John Laurendo for his tireless efforts in helping to troubleshoot the technical difficulties we experienced in setting this the webcam, and to Charlie Smith for housing the webcam on his property.

Since we can move the webcam remotely, if at any time you would like the camera moved left or right (or up or down) please just click on the *Contact Us* tab on the website and state your request.

Finally, we will continue to use the web shot feature introduced last year as a way of showing other interesting Healey Lake photos.

On The Dock

Lime Swirl Pie

1 pkg. chocolate biscuits

3 Tbsp melted butter

1 pkg of lime Jello

1/2 cup boiling water

1/4 cup lemon juice

1/2 cup granulated sugar

1 can of evaporated milk which has been chilled in the refrigerator for 24 hours

- 1. Place the 13 biscuits on edge around the pie plate.
- 2. Roll out all but 13 biscuits; mix the biscuit crumbs with the melted butter and press into the bottom of a 10" pie plate.
- 3. Dissolve the Jello in the boiling water and dissolve the granulated sugar in this mixture.
- 4. Let the Jello cool.
- 5. Whip the can of chilled evaporated milk until thick. Add the cooled Jello and whip again.
- 6. Pour into the pie plate.
- 7. Chill in the refrigerator until set.
