## West Parry Sound Health Unit Update Fast Tracked Emergency Service at the WPSHU

Wait times in Emergency Departments are often challenging. But at the West Parry Sound Health Centre the problem was skewed towards longer wait times for patients with less severe symptoms



- bladder infections, bug bites and the

like. Wait times for these 'clinic-type' treatments intensify in the summer when a 51% increase in patient volume is compounded by the lack of walk-in clinics in Parry Sound.

To compensate for increased patient volume in previous summers, the Emergency Department (ED) scheduled an additional doctor and nurse from 4 pm to 7 pm daily July through Labour Day long weekend. Attending physicians were local family doctors starting the day in their own clinics and ending it in the Emergency Summer Clinic. Studying the data in January a clear picture emerged. To improve service, the summer clinic hours needed to be changed and the department needed to relieve the congestion. The evidence offered seemingly simple solutions but getting there held new challenges. Along with managing busy practices local family doctors play a key role in West Parry Sound Health Centre operations. They treat patients on the acute care wards, in Emergency and several deliver babies or alternate as Anesthetists and surgical assistants in our busy operating rooms. Now Health Centre officials were asking them to rework demanding summer schedules to manage care in the 'Fast Track' system between noon and 4 pm daily. It took two months organize a timetable for the 'Fast Track' attending physicians!

Once the hours were successfully changed, the final hurdle became the congestion. In the past, all Emergency patients were either in one of the eleven treatment rooms in the ED or in the Summer Clinic situated in the large Clinical Decision Unit in ER. All remaining patients sat together in the Waiting Room giving way to the impression of extreme congestion.

West Parry Sound Health Unit Update cont'd With the new hours in place, a new location was secured. With help from the Health Centre's environmental service team, rooms were configured in short order.

Clear signage and the use of green lines from Emergency to the Fast Track waiting areas have improved patient flow and decreased confusion for staff and patients.

The added bonus is the new volunteer team greeting and serving Fast Track patients. Working hard to get the new system up and running for July, Emergency Department Manager, Shannon Burrows enlisted volunteers in her grandmother (a former nurse), her mother and their friends to work out the kinks guiding patients to the new clinic location. They are currently enjoying encouraging patient feedback.

Here is how Fast Track works Noon to 4 pm daily: All patients are triaged by a registered nurse in the Emergency Department. The RN flags if the patient can go to Fast Track. If registered to Fast Track, patients are given their chart and instructed to follow the green line on the floor to the treatment rooms. There a volunteer greets them, assigns a number and asks the patient to have a seat in the waiting area. Fast Track patients are seen in numerical order in one of three treatment rooms. Patients are assessed, treated by the doctor and discharged.

CEO Donald Sanderson has nothing but praise for Shannon Burrows and the entire ER team (doctors, nurses, support staff and volunteers). "Hats off to Shannon and everyone on the team for making this work. We know that wait times in our emergency department for non-urgent care can become quite long, especially in the summer. The Fast Track program has made a difference for our patients from day one. I am very pleased and proud of the team's accomplishments."

And on a final note, we are pleased to report that patients triaged with severe symptoms classed as 1, 2 or 3 in the Emergency Department at the Health Centre are consistently below the provincial target of 8 hours. Measurement is from the time patients

register or are triaged until the time they leave the Emergency Department.

#### TOWNSHIP OF THE ARCHIPELAGO

A review of the 2012 water quality results has now been posted to the Township web site. This review is intended to complement the *Volunteer Water Quality Monitoring Program Data Report*—2011 also posted on the web site. Following are excerpts from this review:

Healey Lake bacterial levels continue to be good despite having some of the highest concentration of development of the inland lakes. EC levels are in line with previous year's results with only two stations being just above the municipal standard (though only by a small margin). Water quality remains in good condition for recreational purposes in Healey Lake.

**Healey Lake's** water clarity is typically lower than the other southern Archipelago lakes with water clarity depths ranging from 1.7 to 3.4 metres in all locations except Station 7\*, but has not measurably changed in the past five years of sampling. Although Station 7 is lower with an average of 1.7 metres, this level has been consistent for the past 5 years of sampling. The location of Station 7 in a back shallow bay with a good quantity of upstream wetlands may very well explain the reduced water clarity for this Station. The lower water clarity in Healey Lake may be a result of the generally shallow nature of the basin, the areater amount of development, and its location nearer the bottom of the watershed. The lower overall Secchi depths of Healey Lake are somewhat, but not entirely, corroborated by a slightly higher total phosphorus level for Healey Lake, which was measured at 7.1 ug/L in the 2006 season.

In June of this year *BioForest Inc.* made their first 2012 inspection and offered this observation: There appears to be an increase in the numbers of two common species of larger butterflies found in this part of the Province. There were flashes of orange from monarch butterflies and flashes of yellow from tiger swallowtail butterflies.

Since 2003, a network of volunteers in the Township has been assisting *BioForest* with pheromone trapping to monitor and forecast gypsy moth populations. Please remember that *BioForest* is always looking for more volunteers. There are hemlock looper volunteers in the Healey Lake area, but do not currently have any gypsy moth volunteers. If you have oak, birch, and/or poplar on your property and would be interested in hanging a gypsy moth trap, give BioForest a call 1-888-236-7378.

#### **Eyes On The Water**

While relaxing on my deck periodically over the past two months, I have witnessed a number of activities that have caused me concern especially as a retired OPP, a long time boater and boating license instructor.

Number one: The occasional individual who tows a person on a tube or water skis or surf-board without another responsible person keeping watch on the person being towed. The boat operator may have forgotten or does not know that if reported to the police, he or she could be charged with a Criminal Offence; Section 250(1) "Failure to Keep Watch on Person Towed".

Following this the convicted person could encounter difficulties when applying for a passport, a government job, etc.

Number two: The high speed boater travelling at excessive speeds within 30 metres of shore. Not only is the noise aggravating to most cottagers, but it is an extremely dangerous practice. Thirty metres is the equivalent of approximately 100 feet. If the speed boat operator strikes a swimmer or a boater, such as one leaving their dock, the boat operator would be liable in civil court and also be charged with a criminal offence.

Again, for the uninformed, the speed limit is 10 km/h within 30 metres of the shoreline on inland lakes of Ontario. This is a regulation under the Canada Shipping Act 2001 The Criminal Code offence is "Operating a Vessel in a Dangerous Manner" Section 249(1)(b).

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

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## Learning To Fly ... loons of Healey Lake

Another summer is drawing to a close but I wanted to report on the loons that either I have observed or been told about on our lake. Two pairs of loons on our lake have successfully reared chicks. In the narrows (Healey Bay) the loon successfully raised one loon chick (thanks to the observation of Tammy Ross and Nancy Simpson). Unfortunately it was also reported (by Tammy) that there seems to be only one parent left. There were originally 2 chicks however in late July the one chick disappeared as well as one loon parent. In the south west end of the lake (which I have been told is called Lost Lake) the loon pair successfully raised one chick. To date the chicks are learning to dive and obtaining some food on their own. These adult loons will be migrating earlier than the chicks (end of September) to the Gulf and the young will follow at a later date (late November) but not return to northern Ontario until they reach maturity which will be in 4 years.

\*\*Again if you have any loon updates (about chicks, loon activity, etc) please call me at 705-375-2324 or email me at nancy.gilchrist@sympatico.ca so I can accurately report on the loon activity on our lake in my annual report to CLLS. This information is extremely important since this organization gathers reported information about Loons throughout Canada to track loon activity and mortality rates throughout the country.

#### <u>Information from Canadian Loon Lake Study (CLLS)-</u> <u>Loons are susceptible to West Nile.</u>

The CLLS has reported that an entire family of loons has died after being infected by the West Nile virus. Parent loons and two chicks were observed swimming erratically, unable to right themselves in the water and in four days were all dead. Autopsies were performed and they were reported to have died from the virus. If anyone observes dead or dying loons they should contact the Canadian Cooperative Wildlife Health

I will be completing the *Canadian Lakes Loon Study* (CLLS) report for the 2012 statistics at the end of this month. The CLLS was begun in Ontario in 1981 to assess the long-term health and productivity of Common Loons and the lakes they depend on. Loons are top predators and their survival reflects a broader lake health. They fulfill the same role as the canaries fulfilled in the coal mines – acting as an indicator of environmental conditions.

Bird Studies Canada is currently analyzing 30+ years of CLLS data. Some 4500 lakes have been monitored which will translate into information for nearly 19,000 attempts by breeding pairs. We await the full report this 2012 calendar year but loon productivity appears to be showing a gradual decline over time with the occasional peak every 10 years. More details will be available in the Spring 2013 *Dock Talk*.



#### Layered Salad

Layer the rest of the ingredients in the following order: a layer of lettuce on the bottom of the bowl, then

- a layer of celery
- a layer of sweet pepper
- a layer of chopped eggs
- a layer of peas
- a layer of onions
- a layer of crumbled bacon

Spread the mayonnaise/sugar mixture over the top of the salad like cake icing. Sprinkle grated cheese evenly over it all. Seal the bowl with plastic wrap and refrigerate overnight (or for 8 to 12 hours before serving).
