A Wild Goose Chase

My daughter and I own a cottage on Healey Lake in Muskoka that was built by my father-in- law almost 60 years ago.

lan, a kind and generous friend, offered to help me open the cottage this spring and we agreed to do so on Friday, believing, for some strange reason, that Environment Canada's weather forecast of fine weather might actually prove to be accurate. It didn't, so we had to complete the outside work between early afternoon rain showers and an evening thunder storm that threatened "severity" for more than an hour and then materialized only in an anemic, half-hearted sort of way.

After making the dock and the water system operational, we turned our attention to a number of inside tasks, with which we were busily engaged when we heard a goose honking loudly and almost incessantly, which is not normal goose behaviour. We stopped what we were doing and went to the window to see if we could see the goose whose errant behaviour drew our attention.

lan saw the goose first, about 300 metres away, swimming to the west, in the middle of the lake.

Then he noticed something with a black head and snout, swimming 10 or so metres behind, obviously giving chase. This seemed very odd because the water temperature was barely above freezing. We quickly



found the binoculars and a closer inspection revealed that the black thing in the water was a dog, which from a distance we were sure was a black labrador. The owner of said dog was nowhere to be seen. Never having witnessed anything like this, our eyes remained glued to the goose and dog drama unfolding in front of our eyes.

After watching for a few minutes, it became obvious the goose was in no danger and that in fact she seemed to be having a grand time as she swam in huge circles, leading the dog first west,

then south, then east. Back and forth, around in circles, away from shore and towards shore; whichever way the goose led, the dog followed.

Occasionally the goose would allow the dog to "catch up" to within two or three metres, at which point the dog would get



really excited and put on a burst of speed, with head extended high above the water. With the added exertion, we could hear the dog puffing and we started to worry that the dog would become exhausted and drown. The thought crossed our minds: "Is the goose trying to drown this dog"?

From time to time the goose's "mate" joined in the fun and frolic. Now the dog had to decide "Should I chase A or B?" This quandary seemed to cause the dog great concern: as a result the dog changed direction frequently, first chasing A, then B, then A again. After watching for close to fifteen minutes, during the third "burst of speed" episode, we decided we had better get in the boat and see what we could do to prevent the dog from exhausting itself and drowning. As we were starting the motor, we noticed a boat from a cottage on the far shore set out in the direction of the dog, however, not knowing for sure what the people in this boat were about to do, we kept going. The other boat did approach the dog very closely, but neither of the people in this boat made any attempt to try to coax or lift the dog into their boat. Then, in very short order, they reversed direction and returned to their dock. We followed this boat and, on landing at their dock, found the people in this boat to be a young mother and her 3 or 4 year old seemingly shy and quiet, daughter.

Shortly after we landed at their dock, with the goose now gone, the dog started to swim for home, and didn't seem to have slowed down one iota. The mother told us the dog was a black labrador named Rosie; that she was three years old and that she was her daughter's dog. She also told us that Rosie loves to chase water fowl, especially loons, and that no matter what she or her husband say or do, Rosie will not change her ways.

Otherwise, Rosie is a wonderfully warm and loving dog. We said our good-byes and headed for home.

Previously, when the words "a wild goose chase" were uttered, a myriad of images coursed through my mind; all with the goose making every effort to escape almost certain doom. Now there will be only one image: a wild goose and a black labrador swimming in ice cold water, the goose leading, the dog in determined pursuit, and the goose, that is in no danger whatsoever, is savouring every moment of the "chase".

Flying Squirrels

It has been a few years since I have seen one of these squirrels up close but they are still around in the woods at Healey Lake. Because they are nocturnal,



not many people actually see them and therefore think that they are rare in northern Ontario. In fact there are many (approximately 25 subspecies) throughout Northern Ontario. They can be found in most of Canada except for the southern parts of Ontario, Alberta and Saskatchewan. If you have been out late at night you might see something gliding between branches in the trees. Flying squirrels are 25 to 37 cm in length (10 to 14 inches) and can glide effortlessly as far as 30 metres (98 feet) at a time because of a furry membrane called a patagium - it is like a giant sail attached between the front and rear legs. Actually depending on the wind and take off height they can actually glide 50 metres (164 feet) or more. The flying squirrel also has a flat, furry tail that is uses like a rudder while gliding. It can actually steer left and right and even make a 180 degree turn using its' tail and membrane between its' legs. They also can easily retract this membrane to enable it to be very fast running around and climbing trees. According to some articles these ancient members of the squirrel family are 30 million years old. They actually do not hibernate in winter but will store food. They will sleep in groups and share nests with up to 50 other flying squirrels to keep warm. Sometimes they also may move from nest to nest each night.

These squirrels have big button eyes, rounded ears and soft brown fur with a white underbelly and white under its' furry membrane. They also have something called "feelers" which are sensitive whiskers which make nocturnal travel

easier. In order for the squirrel to mark its' route in the forest it uses scent glands in its' cheeks. These squirrels are most active between dusk and dawn.

They have their young between late April and June. Their diet consists of mushrooms, fungi, nuts, tree sap, insects, bird eggs, buds and flowers and they will use hollows in trees, woodpecker cavities or during the hot summer months they will use leaves to build outside nests known as dreys.

The flying squirrel has many predators; the owl, raccoon, coyote, weasel, house cat, and snakes are just a few and they have to rely on its ability to blend in to its environment. Its eyesight is not all that great, so its instinct is to remain perfectly still in the hope that the predator will not see them. If it does get caught it is actually able to break off its' tail in order to escape!

When you are out at night, gazing at the stars, take a look in the woods, up high in the trees to find these nocturnal creatures.

End of Summer Report

Locators added to vehicles & boats



The township vehicles and boats have been equipped with locators as our employees are out on the water alone in the summer in all kinds of weather and on our back roads at night plowing in poor weather conditions.

Townships share resources

McDougall Township has acquired a new state of the art asphalt repair system which we will rent this fall to do repairs before winter. Some of our neighbors will be renting the new sweeper that runs off a 3/4 ton truck that we acquired this summer. The agreement for sharing services and employees with Carling Township while each retains their own service levels, programs and independence is working well and saving money. It has led to other municipalities communicating on how to cooperate to avoid duplication and save money. At a meeting with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Minister was most interested in how it was set up and how well it is working.

Official Plan reviewed

The first public meeting of the five year review of our official plan has been held. You can find information on our web site and I encourage you to participate as it sets the direction of our municipality will move in and it is supported by the bylaws we live by. There will be more meetings over the next year and all people, groups and associations are asked for input.

Water & forest testing program

The new agreement with the Georgian Bay Biosphere is in place and they will be looking after both the water and forest testing programs. They are also developing a educational fun day program to be held with cooperation from the associations. Ted Thompson a long time employee of the township, now retired will be working with them during the summer months. Phosphorus testing is also coming on stream.

Policing costs

Now the government has a majority they are pushing ahead with the increased O.P.P. costs. A new formula reduces the cost some but it is still very high and will result in a large tax increase. Sequin Township and the Archipelago are still exploring the cost of local service with Carling Township showing some interest in contracting for service. We were paying approximately \$120,000.00 a year for service. Next we were told it would increase to approximately \$1,200,000.00. Now as far as I can see the formula will work out to approximately \$650,000.00 - still far too much for the services we get. Keep tuned by my next report. I will have more accurate figures along with the amount of service each municipality in our area requires and gets.

It's back to school time and I hope we can all enjoy a great fall after the summer we have had.



Municipal Election October 27, 2014

As we go to press, Grant Walker is the only candidate running for council in Ward 6 so he could be acclaimed in the upcoming election. Grant received a resounding vote of confidence at the HLPOA Annual Meeting on September 1, '14. He has done a great job of representing our interests in the Archipelago and also of keeping us informed. His regular contribution to Dock Talk is very much appreciated Thanks Grant! Here's to another four years.

Directory



Three-way effort ... fixes the dam

The dam, originally constructed by loggers in the late 1800's, and rebuilt in the 1920's, was becoming a concern for area residents. Concern over the dam's integrity led to a three-way deal for reconstructing the dam.

The Ministry of Natural Resources, the Township of the Archipelago, and the Healey Lake Property Owners all pooled their resources together in order to shore up the dam. Under the agreement, the Healey Lake Property Owners was responsible for the cost of supplying all materials delivered to the dam and providing the labour. The MNR undertook the costs of design and supervised the construction. The Township of the Archipelago assisted in the co-ordination of this project and arranged with the Parry Sound Trails Council the services of two Environmental Youth Students.

The contractor, the Georgian Bay

Management staff, and the Property Owners Association worked from dawn to dusk constructing



the new dam. Approximately 2,300 sand bags were piled upon plastic to make a coffer dam upstream while the old dam was cleaned and checked for flaws & weak spots.



Once the old dam was stabilized,construction on the new dam began. The new dam was constructed using the remains of the old.

A wood frame was built, and concrete poured in the frame, around several reinforcing beams. The concrete had to be piped 400 feet to reach the site.



Once the concrete hardened, the frame was removed, lumber salvaged and sold off.



Lake water levels will be controlled by

water overflow, maintaining a consistent level. The entire project was scheduled for completion in one month.
