PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As I write this message in early March, the rain seems to have stopped in favour of snow, and the lake is ready to host snowmobilers, cross country skiers and even skaters?? (look for more on skating in another article).

There should be about 6 weeks of good winter fun ahead of us, but like many, I am quietly waiting for Spring & Summer.

The Cottage Watch program has been organized and is now underway. Each member of the Association should have at least one cottage inspection this winter. I would also ask those that use their cottages in the winter to at least casually monitor their neighbours who may only use the cottage for two or three seasons.

The snow-load on most roofs, at least judging by mine, doesn't seem to be a problem at this time. There has been lots of snow, but also a lot of melting.

The Eastern webcam is out of service. It is unlikely that it will be up and running before spring. A new camera is required and we may have to find a new site. Dave Duggan is working on solutions. The Western camera at Charlie Smith's is in action and provides a good view of the lake conditions.

Amanda Vincent of the Ministry of Natural Resources visited the dam last fall to try an easy fix for the leak. It was not successful but Amanda has been helpful with describing the process involved in making dam repairs. It is very, however, bureaucratic and time consuming.

We are looking at an option that involves drilling and the injection of cement. This option is being used on the dam on Lake Kawagama. I hope to have something more to discuss with the Association membership by the annual meeting.

David Pols, a long time Association member, has decided to retire (at 87!) from providing an independent year-end review of the HLPOA financials. There are very few, if any activities in which David and his wife Pam have not fully participated, not the least of which was the pre-computer era preparation and distribution for 16 years of Dock Talk. On behalf of all Members, I want to personally thank David and Pam for their many, many contributions to lake activities over the years.

In years past, most attempts ended soon after the clearing of an area - and some before we even got a chance to skate. Wind, rain, snow, (and occasionally snowmobilers) have all spoiled the surface within a day or two.

This year, you will see from the pictures that we had a great start. The snow was fluffy and easy to clear. The ice was hard and smooth with only a few minor blemishes.

Grant has shared that the Community Police Advisory Committee (CPAC) has been advised of the new Citizen Self-Reporting Tool for : (On-line Program)located at www.opp.ca/reporting

Use this system to report:

- ✓ Lost/missing property under \$5,000
- ✓ Stolen license plates or validation stickers
- ✓ Theft from a vehicle under \$5,000
- ✓ Mischief to a vehicle under \$5.000
- ✓ Mischief under \$5,000 (damage to property other than a vehicle)
- ✓ Theft under \$5,000
- ✓ Driving Complaints

DO NOT use this system:

If the occurrence is an emergency

- ✗ If the occurrence happened outside of OPP jurisdiction
- **X** If there are any identifiable suspects
- X If anyone was injured
- **X** If the occurrence involves a weapon
- If the occurrence involves any damage to a motor vehicle due to an actual or apparent collision, including fail to remain collisions
- ✗ If the occurrence involves a break and enter to a place (e.g. unlawful entry and theft from a house, a building or a structure)
- If the total value of the property or damage exceeds \$5,000
- If the occurrence involves drugs or gambling (including lottery tickets)
- X If the occurrence involves a passport
- If the occurrence involves a lost or missing license plate, validation sticker or disabled parking permit (no theft involved).

TIPS FOR WINTER LAKE VISITS

For newer cottagers or those planning to head to the lake for the first time this winter, there are a few things to think about before venturing out. Here are some suggestions for things to consider and bring on your first adventure to the lake:

- 1. Ice Conditions: Since most of our lake consists of 'boatin' properties, knowing the conditions of the lake in the area where your property is located is key. Differing depths and currents mean parts of the lake freezes and thaws at different paces, and can even vary by time of day. While keeping an eye on the web cam helps, be sure to consult folks in your lake area and listen closely to the weather report before deciding to visit. Remember, when in doubt, don't venture out and ALWAYS travel with a buddy. Ice picks and flotation winter suits can be purchased at various recreational sport stores for reasonable prices. Cell phones are a good idea to carry at all times. If you are worried about water damage, a Ziploc bag can do the trick while outside. Lastly, steer well clear of all dock bubblers regardless of ice thickness. These systems prevent ice from forming around docks and can make surrounding ice unstable.
- **2. Entryways**: In addition to the main public dock between Lakeshore and Mariner's cove, Pine Bay, and FoxBack landings are both plowed during the winter.

- Depending upon where your cottage is located, it may be a much closer walk/snow shoe or sled ride from these locations during the winter months even if you normally get to your cottage from the marinas in summer. Take a look at the map and set the quickest route.
- 3. Provisions: For those visiting for the first time, a high sided sleigh is a great way to bring supplies in and out by foot or snowmobile. Unless you are lucky enough to have a winterized water system, water jugs for drinking are a must. Consider an ice auger to drill a hole in the ice to retrieve water for washing dishes or other needs. They can be purchased at the local hardware store in your area and can be invaluable to have for water retrieval and fishing! While this may sound primitive to some, it will interest you to know that the majority of winter visitors do not have water and manage just fine for many days at a time. If you do use an auger and make a hole of any size, be sure to mark it clearly to prevent injury to others. And of course...whatever you fancy for meals, don't forget to bring your beverages of choice to enjoy inside or lakeside :-). There's nothing quite like a lawn chair on the ice on a sunny day! :-)

- 4. Water: As we noted earlier, bringing in water is a common practice of many cottagers on the lake. Residents with winterized waterlines will enjoy the beauty of heat tracing to keep water lines thawed and working during their stay, but even they are not foolproof when the temperature really drops. NOTE: If you are running your water system during the winter, drain your water lines/add glycol to toilets and drains before leaving and/or leave a bit of heat on to avoid freezing in colder temperatures. If in doubt consult a local plumber for advice.
- 5. Heating: Winter cottagers use a variety of solutions to heat their properties from base board heating to woodstoves, pellet stoves and space heaters. Be sure whatever you use has been safety certified and in good condition. Cottages that have been skirted or insulated underneath will definitely maintain internal heat better than those with open foundations but all are functional once the heat gets circulating. The amount of sun during the day can also impact how warm your cottage is during your stay. Inexpensive slippers and an extra layer of clothing can help make sure you and your family are cozy and comfortable.
- 6. Amenities: Winter cottagers have devised all kinds of ways to make the call of nature a comfortable one. If you are not in a winterized property (and most are not), an outhouse or enviro-toilet is a must. Even with year round septic, freeze ups can still happen. If you don't have an outhouse as backup, consider a port-a-potty for late night use. Some cottagers have gotten quite creative over the years—a fully heated outhouse can be pretty sweet in the dead of winter!

"THE LAKE-ED CHEF"

Smoky Beef, Potato and Mushroom Stew

When purchasing the beef make sure that it has a good amount of fat marbling. This will allow it to withstand the long cooking period and make for a succulent and tender stew.

INGREDIENTS

□ 3 tbsp (45 mL) vegetable oil
□ 3 lbs (1.5 kg) stewing beef
□ ½ cup (125 mL) all-purpose flour
□ ½ cups (625 mL) stout or porter
□ 3 cups (750 mL) onions, coarsely chopped
□ 4 cups (1 L) mushrooms, quartered
□ 3 tbsp (45 mL) garlic, finely chopped
□ 2 tbsp (30 mL) fresh sage, finely chopped
□ ½ cup (175 mL) smoky-style barbecue sauce
□ 4 cups (1 L) gold potatoes, peeled and cut into cubes
□ 2 cups (500 mL) celery, finely chopped
□ Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste
□ ½ cup (125 mL) flat leaf parsley, coarsely chopped

DIRECTIONS

1. In a large sauté pan, heat oil over medium high heat and brown the beef in 2 batches until browned well on all sides, about 10 minutes per batch. Remove beef from pan and place in slow cooker. Add flour to pan and stir together with remaining fat, add 1 cup (250 mL) of the beer to the pan and scrape up browned bits. Increase heat until mixture thickens, about 2 minutes, then add all of this mixture to the slow cooker.

☐ ½ cup (125 mL) green onions, finely sliced

- 2. To the slow cooker also add the remaining beer, onions, mushrooms, garlic, sage, barbecue sauce, potatoes, celery and salt.
- 3. Cook on low for 9 hours. Once the stew is ready, season to taste with salt and pepper, stir in the parsley and green onions and serve.


